## CPR/AED and First Aid for Mariners March 9, Saturday

Take advantage of this opportunity to become CPR Certified by Annapolis Fire Department emergency medical personnel at half the cost you would pay elsewhere. Because SOS encourages you to learn and maintain skills in CPR (cardiopulmonary resuscitation), the use of the Automated External Defibrillator (AED) and in first aid... SOS pays half the cost of the training. Whether you are learning these techniques for the first time, or recertifying, there is always more to learn. Recommended procedures are always being updated.

## More Medical Training Opportunities at Spring Training

You've heard of CPR training and its life-saving importance? In recent years the Department of Homeland Security has promoted a Stop the Bleed campaign based on research that bleeding in the moments before the arrival of first responders, lives can be saved with this simple but important training.

Stop the Bleed is a national awareness campaign and callto-action. It is intended to cultivate grassroots efforts that encourage bystanders to become trained, equipped, and empowered to help in a bleeding emergency before professional help arrives. No matter how rapid the arrival of professional emergency responders, bystanders will always be first on the scene.

A person who is bleeding can die from blood loss within five minutes, therefore it is important to quickly stop the blood loss. Those nearest to someone with life threatening injuries are best positioned to provide first care. Through health centers, hospitals, fire departments, and organizations, certified trainers provide this life-saving training in the simple skills and techniques that make a difference.

This year, SOS is providing Stop the Bleed training as part of its Spring Training Emergencies on the Bay sessions. With the expertise of two of our members who are registered nurses (including Chuck Fort, a certified Stop the Bleed trainer), participants in the "Name of the Session" (see A-3 or B-1 selections) will receive first aid strategies

for common sailing health and first aid situations and be certified in Stop the Bleed.
