Flare & Safety Demo April 30



The Safety Committee is planning the Flare and Fire Safety Demonstration for Saturday morning, April 30 from 8 a.m. to 10 a.m. The location for the event is Camp Wabanna in Edgewater.

Following safety techniques demonstrated by instructors, our participants will have the opportunity to fire aerial flares, set off hand-held

flares, and extinguish a small, controlled fire using a fire extinguisher. This is a rare opportunity for hands-on experience for dealing with emergencies.

Members will also practice coiling and heaving lines, a skill that is used frequently during the sailing season at raft-ups and setting an anchor. There is no charge for this event.

Dockside Training provides an opportunity for new members to have an introduction or refresher on sailing with SOS. You will meet aboard various members'

boats in the afternoon for a session structured to simulate an SOS cruise, but not leave the dock. What am I expected to do when leaving the dock and more?

Choptank Plastic Pollution Study

Plastic pollution in the ocean is a problem that's gotten increasing attention in recent vears. But smaller plastics in smaller waterways get a little less exposure-and in Bay the watershed, the threat is just as real.

The University of Maryland Center for Environmental Science (UMCES) just began a two-year study to understand how plastic moves through tributaries and coastal areas to the ocean. The research project in the Choptank River watershed will "lay the foundation for plastic research in the Chesapeake Bay," UMCES says.

Funded by NOAA's Marine Debris Program, the project will track how microplastics move through the Choptank rivershed on Maryland's Eastern Shore. It will look at what kind of plastics are in the waterway, and how marsh wetlands and underwater grasses impact their flow. Researchers want to know where these barely-visible plastic particles end up during different seasons through the year.

And the answers to these questions could actually help the larger ocean plastics problem, too. Eye-popping studies find that up to 95 percent of waste on the shoreline, water surface, and sea floor is plastic. But few studies have focused on coastal wetlands like underwater grasses or marshes.

"A lot of attention is paid to the giant garbage patch in the Pacific Ocean, but those plastics came from somewhere. We have to understand where they are coming from and what happens to them before they get to the ocean," said Associate Professor Jamie Pierson. "How

Microplastics are defined as pieces of plastic debris less than 5 millimeters in size, or smaller than a pencil eraser. Because they're so small, the particles can enter the food chain by being ingested by the smallest organisms at the bottom of the food chain, possibly carrying upwards to the top of the food chain.

In addition to gathering information about microplastics' travel, the project will determine which factors and strategies could help reduce marine debris in rivers the most. Extensive samples of six different kinds of plastic debris will be collected. Different types of plastic differently and degrade different densities. Researchers will use a short-wave infrared radiation microscope, along with a drone that can scope out larger plastic debris in the watershed from above. With a a special camera, it can identify different types of plastic, from plastic bags to water bottles.

"Potentially, we'll be able to make the connection between bigger pieces of plastic in a marsh that break down, and the pieces feeding into the river system leading to microplastics in the water. We're hoping to figure out if different types of debris get moved in different ways," said Pierson.

94% of Plastics Stay in The Bay

The vast majority of plastic pollution that makes its way into the rivers of the Chesapeake Bay stays in and along local waters and is not, as researchers put it, "exported" to the ocean.

This was among the findings of a modeling exercise conducted by researchers from Pennsylvania State University with the help of the Virginia Institute of Marine Science. The scientists wondered why the amount of plastic particles entering the ocean appeared to be considerably less than what runs off of the land in places like the Bay watershed. What, they asked, is happening to the rest?

They suspected that the Chesapeake Bay—which has long been a swirling sink for other types of pollution—could be functioning as a catchall for plastics, too. But the conclusions still surprised them.

The model results indicated that about 94 percent of microplastics—particles measuring 5 millimeters or less in diameter—fed into the system via its rivers stayed in the system, most likely on or along the shores. About 5 percent of the particles were carried from the Bay to the ocean and 1 percent remained suspended in the water column.

Half of these microplastics were deposited onto shorelines within a week or two, and most washed up not far from where they first entered a tributary.

"We were expecting more export out onto the shelf," said Alexander López, a postdoctoral researcher at Penn State and the study's lead author. Preliminary findings indicate that the Bay's ecosystem could be bearing the brunt of microplastics that enter it, rather than conveying the bulk of them to the ocean.
